



<u>The capacity building for local partners and relevant stakeholders is very crucial.</u> This approach will empower communities to take ownership of their roles in supporting survivors, increase service accessibility, and expand the range of services available to meet survivors' needs.



Recommendations:

- **1.Implement Capacity Building Initiatives**: Develop targeted training programs for local government and community partners to enhance their skills in child protection, safe migration, counseling, and other relevant areas.
- **2.Promote Community Ownership**: Encourage local stakeholders to take ownership of programs by involving them in decision-making processes and program implementation.
- **3.Expand Service Offerings**: Support local partners in expanding their service offerings, enabling them to provide a broader range of services beyond awareness raising, including counseling and support for survivors.
- **4.Establish Community Support Teams**: Create and empower community support teams composed of diverse members (DCWC/CCWC, teachers, village leaders) to assist in client management and service delivery.
- **5.Evaluate and Adapt**: Regularly assess the effectiveness of capacity-building initiatives and community support teams to ensure they meet the evolving needs of survivors and the community.
